Sermon Notes - Adrian Morton
Ephesians 2:11-22
Importance of Remembering & The Presence....

I want to continue working through Ephesians this week and look at this passage from Ch2.

And pick up just two themes..

The first theme comes from verses 11 and 12...

Paul has just told this church that they are created in Christ Jesus to do good works, which God prepared in advance for us to do.

Then he says, 'Therefore, remember.. you used to be Gentiles...
v12 - '... remember... that you were once separated from Christ...'

If you are going to do these good works then you need to remember...

And he goes on to talk about both Gentiles and Jews are now One in Christ...

So its a great passage about unity of course..

But I want to pull out this theme of 'Remembering...'

It's important that we keep reminding ourselves what God has done for us.

And actually if you remember last week, I was saying that the first half of this letter is essentially about what God has done for us in Christ.

But it's important that we keep reminding ourselves what God has done for us.

Because the privileges we now enjoy in Christ will be appreciated all the more.

And I think, particularly, if we are in a hard place.
Or a confusing place..
Or a spiritually dry place...

Remembering what God has done for us is so important.

Because it will encourage and strengthen us in the present.

And if you are someone who can look back at particular promises God has made over your life, then again it is so important to remember those, because it will help us deal better with plans not being realised or just being a spiritually dry place.

And it's not as if we have forgotten what God has done for us.
Or forgotten the promises he has made over our life.

It's just that life will bring many distractions and crowds out our minds.

There is only so much our minds can contain.

So it's more about 'bringing to attention' again those things.
Reminding ourselves...

This is what God has done.
These are the promises over my life...

I'm really enjoying reading this book at the moment - 'Redigging the Wells' by Stephen Mawditt'.

It's the continuing story of church renewal in rural Norfolk.

It's the church that I was converted in, and Louise's family is still part of.

Louise and I get a very brief mention near the beginning!

But it has reminded me why I think like I do in many respects when it comes to church.

Why I have a particular vision for church.
The values I have.

So things like
holding a 'charismatic doctrine of the baptism of the Holy Spirit, seeking alternative forms of worship and church life,
trying to make the church attractive to unbelievers and the unchurched,
evangelism through personal contacts,
an expectation of signs and wonders...

All these things that have shaped me come from this church..
The vision and values that have shaped that church.

And Remembering them, bringing them to mind again, has been so encouraging.

Its like, Oh yes, this is why I do what I do!
This is what God has called me to...

In 2 Peter Ch1, Peter famously talks about spiritual fruit... he says,

make every effort to add to your faith goodness; and to goodness, knowledge; and to knowledge, self-control; and to self-control, perseverance; and to perseverance, godliness; and to godliness, mutual affection; and to mutual affection, love.

and he then says, if anyone doesn't have these things, he is short-sighted and blind, and has **forgotten** that he has been cleansed from past sins.

How we grow spiritually is related to how well we remember what God has done for us.

And again, it's not that we have completely forgotten.

It's more that we need to call them to mind, to bring back to our attention these things.

Because the world, in all its busyness, can very easily crowd it out.

Our minds can very easily get distracted.

As we start to come out of this pandemic, albeit slowly and cautiously, I think many people are re-evaluating what life is about.

I saw on the news this week that the hotels and shops are rejoicing because the Silverstone grand prix is happening this weekend.

One hotelier though said he had vacancies for 170 staff.

He said it was hard to recruit people because many people are now not wanting to work unsociable hours or at the weekend.

People are re-evaluating life.
I know some are re-evaluating church life.
What is it for, what is my role now...

However we are thinking, let's not forget what God has done for us.
What he has called us to....
And if relevant and you know, what are the particular promises of God on my life...

The second theme I want to mention comes from the last verse of our reading.

Paul says, "*in him you too are being built together to become a dwelling in which God lives by his Spirit.*"

He's just been talking about God's people.

Its a reminder that the church is the people of God in a local area.

That is what's important.
Not our buildings.
They just exist to serve the mission of the people.

(In the Church of England, we really do get hung up on the importance of ancient buildings...)

But Paul is saying here that the people of God is to become a dwelling place in which God lives by His Spirit.

The life of God, His presence, is to be among the people, when we meet together...

In the OT, the people of Israel focussed their life around the temple because that is where God's presence dwelt.

Via the ark of the covenant.

What marked them out as the people of God was that the presence of God with them.

That hasn't changed... what marks us out as the people of God is the presence of God amongst us... via His Spirit.

In practice, this means an emphasis on worship.

We 'Enter into his gates with thanksgiving,
and into his courts with praise'... as it says in
Psalm 100.

So, as His people, we develop an
expectation and desire for His presence.

So we try and give the Spirit space to work
and minister.

And sometimes that will feel awkward...
Sometime it will feel clumsy..
Sometimes we'll think nothing is happening
or going on...

But however we move forward as church.
And the DCC at Wollaston on Monday
mentioned briefly about the possibility of re-
introducing some kind of 'Pursuing His
presence' service...

But what ever we decide, probably from the
Autumn, for me there has to be an emphasis
on worship AND time and space for the Spirit
to minister.

To allow the life of God, if you like, to be
manifest amongst us.

And that's whenever we meet.
During the morning or within an evening
service...

The Bethel church leaders are fond of
saying, 'The church owes the world an
encounter with God.'

When we are in our work places, our
community, those we leisure with.. we owe
people a Spirit filled life...

Often we are not going to be able to 'debate'
people into the Kingdom of God.

But we can release the presence of God
over their lives.
By praying for them...

So, when we meet, we can't just be content
with talking about God.
Extolling good doctrine.

Having a well keep ancient building...

Having excellent refreshments, imaginative
children and youth work...

All those things are important...

But people need to encounter the presence
of God.

The life of God... Amen!
